
#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

## Out of Our Past—Eliza Smith's Cookie Recipes

Over 20 years ago the late Mildred McChesney offered me a stained paper billhead bearing the printed name of Paul J. Smith, operator of a Cropseyville general store, on one side and two hand-written cookie recipes on the other. The signature of Eliza Smith appeared below the recipes. "Who was Eliza?" I asked. Mildred hadn't noticed the signature, studied it briefly, and concluded Eliza was one of her mother's ancestors, an older cousin, "I don't remember her," Mildred said. I took the aged paper and later checked census records and determined Eliza had been the wife of James L. Smith, a wagon maker, and was a resident of Cropseyville in the late 1800s through 1910. Her children were Fanny and Percy. I found Eliza's photograph in the Society's 1978 publication Brunswick...A Pictorial History, and additional research revealed Eliza was the daughter of Jane Morrison and David L. Cropsey and a granddaughter of Henry Morrison. Her husband James, an Irish immigrant, served with the 125th Regiment, NYS Volunteers during the Civil War.

Our Society's recent restoration of the Morrison Cemetery on the hill behind the Cropseyville farm founded by Henry Morrison about 1789 revealed Eliza Cropsey Smith was one of those buried there. I scanned the paper with the recipes and it was included among the images Joe Ferrannini used in his presentation at our 2015 annual meeting. As several meeting attendees indicated an interest in the recipes, we offer transcriptions of Eliza Smith's recipes below. Perhaps our readers will be enticed to fill their kitchens with the scent of freshly baked cookies as the cooler days of fall approach!

#### Eliza's Sugar Cookies

1 egg broken into a cup filler with butter
2 cups of sugar
1 teaspoon of soda into 1/2 cup of sweet milk
1 teaspoons lemon
Mix as soft as you can roll

#### Eliza's Molasses Cookies

1 tea cup of sour cream

1 tea cup of sugar

1 tea cup of molasses

1/2 tea cup of butter

1 small teaspoons of soda in the cream

Note: in days gone by it was not unusual for cooks to omit listing obvious ingredients in the recipe - in this instance the flour. "Soda" meant baking soda.



#### October 5th Program Meeting

"Victory Turned into Mourning"
Farewell to Lincoln and Grant at the New
York State Capitol



One hundred and fifty years ago as the nation mourned its martyred president, a special funeral train journeyed from Washington D.C. to Springfield, Illinois. Albany, New York was one of the major stops on its route. On April 26<sup>th</sup>, Lincoln's body lay in state in the old State Capitol building while 50,000 people filed by to pay their respects. At the exact same time, over 400 miles to the south, assassin John

Wilkes Booth was cornered in a tobacco barn, shot by a New York cavalryman, and died of his wounds.

Twenty years later the New York State Capitol was once again the scene of a somber farewell as President Ulysses S. Grant lay in state in the new Capitol Building.

This program will explore these solemn events and their connection to the New York State Capitol.

Biography: Stuart W. Lehman works with the New York State Office of General Services as an Assistant Curator for the New York State Capitol. He develops Capitol education programs, and tours, including "living history" programs. He also conducts research into the history of the Capitol Building. Previously he worked with the New York State Bureau of Historic Sites at Senate House, Herkimer Home, and Schuyler Mansion. On weekends he participates in Revolutionary War re-enactments as a Colonial Doctor. He lives in Guilderland New York.
