Their home located on Moonlawn Road was the site of the "Former Brunswick Creamery" and dates back to approximately 1900. We thank Bob and Becky for documenting and sharing the history of their home.

With this addition the historical society has presented more than 20 historic building markers to residents in the Town of Brunswick.

Newspaper articles relating to the Town of Brunswick are clipped from The Troy Record and The Advertiser then sorted, copied and filed. This arduous task was completed this past year by Betsy Durivage, Warren Rymiller, and Shirley Madsen who collectively spent over 450 hours volunteering their time. Typical clippings included articles relating to vital statistics, education, local news, organizations, town government, religion, and new businesses.

The Collection Committee also puts in many volunteer hours accessioning items donated to the Society. In the past year they worked 104 hours accessioning 66 items. PAST DAYS IN BRUNSWICK

It was my birthplace – the place of kindly mountains and slow-running streams, of far stretching fields and clusters of horses. It was winters of high boots, of chill-blains and tingling fingers, of playing fox and geese in the school-yard snow, of oil lamps and long evenings.

It was lunch boxes of chicken sandwiches and mother's home-make cake – enjoyed in the shade of trees in the school's backyard. As spring came there were pussy willows to be found and moth eggs to be gathered – and boys brought pollywogs to school in glass jars.

It was early rising to be ready for a shopping day in the city and the unconquerable fear of new surroundings, the cluttered rows of stores and the pounding of wagon wheels on stone-paved streets. It was waiting at the Gifford House for the horses to be hitched for the return trip home after shopping. It was the rumble of great trains through the Congress Street tunnel – trains that sped southward into a nowhere of unexperienced journeys and fascinating sights.

And suddenly it was summer! We knew its signs – hot days that beckoned our thoughts to the swimming pool at the dam on the Quackenkill – to the bathing gear of sateen suits and thigh-high stockings, to be drawn from winter storage – and the hired man taking "mooning" under the pear tree that sheltered the side of the house, in the place where the south wind carried the scent of new-mown clover and fanned sweaty brows, witness to the labor of a morning of storing hay in neighboring barns – cavernous and heavy with heat.

It was the quiet of early autumn days, of harvesting gardens – and of barrels filled with potatoes ready to be trucked to Troy markets, before daylight – a time consuming journey – and waiting the return of the tired driver.

It was one special day of the autumn when a grandmother, preparing a meal for the return of her son, slipped quietly to the kitchen floor, and death called for the first time in the life of a little girl. As she mourned on the front steps of the old house, dusk closed in and an owl hooted from the loneliness of the woods across the Quackenkill. So it was that she came to know that life brings changes as do the seasons.

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RECIPES

The following are recipes that were printed in a cook book titled "Brunswick Cooking Heritage" which was produced by the Society in 1976. These recipes were submitted by long-time members who are no longer with us.

TOP OF STOVE BREAD PUDDING Florence Grabo

2 slices bread (cubed) 1/2 cup sugar

3 eggs

1 pint milk

1/2 cup raisins

1 tsp. vanilla

nutmeg

Put in double boiler. Sprinkle with nutmeg and 4 pieces of butter and I/2 cup raisins. Cook over boiling water until silver knife comes out clean.

Serve with any kind of sauce...lemon is delicious.

CARROT BREAD

Agnes Winsor

2 cups grated carrot

1 1/2 cups sugar

4 eggs beaten

1 cup cooking oil

3 cups flour

2 tsp. baking powder

2 tsp. baking soda

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. salt

1 cup chopped nuts
