
Genealogy

Forest Park Cemetery Update

<u>Oliver</u>

Peter Oliver was born on Christmas Day in 1859 in Lansingburg. He married Louisa in the spring of 1881. They resided in Brunswick for a time before moving to Colonie. He passed away on Dec 22, 1943 and Louisa passed in 1946.







Pickering

Charles Pickering was born in the Town of Brunswick in 1873. He died in 1952. Charles was a lifelong resident of the town. He and his wife Elizabeth (1877-1941) resided on South Lake Ave. He was a retired wholesale distributer. Elizabeth immigrated to the US in 1895. She was born in Ireland.

Some of you may be familiar with this family. There have been a few articles in our past newsletters about the Pickering family and the farm they owned "Lowland Grove". This farm was once located off the Brunswick Road by Taylor Lane, just before South Lake Ave. They grew produce and flowers which were sold in Troy.

Along with Charles and Elizabeth, their son Guy who was only 2 years old died in 1901, when a branch from a tree fell on him. They also had a child who passed on June 3, 1908.

Elizabeth's mother Catherine Keirman died in March of 1921 at the age of 71. She had lived with Charles and Elizabeth for over 30 years until her death.

There is also Clemence Keirman who died in Providence Rhode Island and was brought back for burial. I'm still trying to find out what his connection was with this family.

The family plot is in the Kings section of the cemetery and there is no head stone.

Charles Pickering, Retired Produce Dealer, Expires

Charles Pickering of South Lake Avenue, retired distributor of wholesale produce, died yesterday morning after a short illness. He was about 79 years of age.

Born in the town of Brunswick, Mr. Pickering was a lifelong resident of this area. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Normond S. Holroyd of Troy; four sons, Charles C. Pickering and Forrest D. W. Pickering of this city, LeRoy H. Pickering of Scotia, and Frank L. Pickering of New Jersey; a sister, Mrs. John S. Young, and a brother, Willard J. Pickering, both of Troy; also five granddaughters and two grandsons.

Private funeral services will be conducted Monday at 10 a.m. from the Himes Funeral Home, 1928 Fifth Avenue, with Rev. George B. Leckonby, formerly of Troy and now rector of St. John's Episcopal Church at Stockport, officiating. Interment will be in Forest Hills Cemetery.

Warren

Lorenzo Warren was born September 1834 in England and came to America when he was a small child. His family resided in Troy. Beginning at age 16 he was listed in the census as being a moulder (making moulds for castings, brick making). At the age of 27 in 1862, he joined the military. He was stationed near Alexandria Virginia where he was captured by the Confederate army and held for 3 days. He was a private in Co. 125 Reg. with the New York Volunteers. He served almost 3 years when he was discharged in June of 1865.



He and his wife Elisabeth settled in the City of Troy where they raised their family.

He is buried with his wife's family. John (1870-1912) and Mary (1887-1926) Gillies, with their two children, Francis (Oct.1908-Dec.1908) and a child (1893-1893).

The only stone in this family plot in the Oneida section of the cemetery is the one of Lorenzo Warren.

Turner

William Turner Sr. (1849-1911) was born in England. He arrived in the United Stated in 1882 with his wife Isabelle (1856—1938) and settled in Troy where they raised their family. William passed away in 1911 at the age of 61. After his death, his wife opened a grocery store near her home, where she worked until her death in 1938. She was well known to all her neighbors in the Stone Hill neighborhood.
