From the first national performance of Uncle Tom's Cabin held at the Troy Museum in 1852 to the temperance troupes that performed in the towns along the Route 22 corridor, Kathy will explore the rich and varied history of entertainment. Many performers will be highlighted including the big band era's Eberle Brothers from Hoosick Falls; Troy's Maureen Stapleton; and concert harpist Van Veachton Rogers from Berlin. We will also learn about the theaters, halls, vaudeville houses, and drive-in theaters that supported entertainment in the county.






FOREST PARK CEMETERY UPDATE

ALEXANDER ALLEN

Alexander S. Allen was born in Vermont in 1859. He and Ella Goewey were married in 1883. They resided in Lansingburgh where Alexander worked as a machinist in the Troy collar factories. The 1930 Troy census shows that Alexander had retired. He lost his wife Ella in 1933 when she was 71. Before his death in 1942, I found that he spent over two years at a state hospital in Poughkeepsie where he died in 1942 at the age of 81.

Mr. Allen was born in this town. and was employed as a machinist for Cluett, Peabody & Co., Inc., for 35 years.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Oora M. Hellins of Troy, and a sis-ter, Mrs. Itta Felluer of Petersburg. N. Y. He was the husband of the late Ella Goewey. The funeral will be held privately

WM. & ISABELLE TURNER

William Turner Sr. (1849-1911) was born in England. He arrived in the United States in 1882 with his wife Isabelle (1856—1938) and they settled in Troy where they raised their family. William passed away in 1911 at the age of 61. After his death, his wife opened a grocery store near her home, where she worked until her death in 1938. She was well known to all her neighbors in the Stone Hill neighborhood.

SOUTH END WOMAN STORE OWNER FOR 37 YEARS, EXPIRES

Mrs. Isabella Turner, Widely-known Stowe Hill Woman, Resident There Sixty Years.

Mrs. Isabella Turner, prominent resident of the Stowe Hill section and known to hundreds in the South End died last night at her home, 198 Stowe Avenue. Mrs. Turner died at 82 after a short

illness.
She had lived in the Stowe Avenue residence for sixty years and for the last 37 years had conducted a grocery store on the hill. Born Isabella Callaway at Ocker

Born Isabelia Callaway at Ocker Hill in Staffordshire, England, the South End resident came to Troy as the young bride of William Turner of England and the pair settled at 198 Stowe Avenue.

Mr. Turner died many years ago. With characteristic resolutions his widow opened a small grocery store which she operated and expanded until being taken ill two weeks ago. She was also the owner of a number of properties in the section and counted many friends among her tenants at her death.

A leading spirit in the affairs of Levings Methodist Church, Mrs. Turner was also an active supporter and gave much of her time to the Stowe Hill Mission, a small religious mission which serves the hill. She was one of the oldest persons on Stowe Hill and was believed to have lived in that section longer than any present resident.

Surviving her, all of Troy, are two sons, Job and C. Frederick Turner, and a daughter, Mrs. Joseph G. Bode. Fourteen grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren also survive.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home. Rev. Fred Richards Brown, pastor of Levings Church, will officiate and burial will be in Forest Park Cemetery.

DELEE FAMILY

Thomas DeLee was born August 1887 in Troy NY. He lived with his parents, Patrick (1860-1934), and Mary (1886-1933), along with his brother John (1886-1962). Thomas served in the Army during WWI, as part of the Criminal Investigation Unit.

Thomas's father Patrick was one of the founders of Trov Meat Dealers and Retail Grocer's Association. They established the grocery firm DeLee & Ryan in 1883. At the time of Patrick's death, it was said that he was one of the oldest merchants in Troy. Thomas's brother John was also involved in the business. By 1929, the family had 17 stores in Troy and surrounding areas.


After Thomas's death, his brother John took over the business. The DeLee family sold their store to the Grand Union Company in 1947, after John retired.

Two members of the DeLee family are buried in Forest Park. Thomas, along with his uncle John Gallei (died 1927), who was his mother's brother.
