## Some Have a Grave Addiction and They're Preserving Our History!

Those who missed the Society's annual meeting and Joe Ferrannini's presentation describing his restoration of the Morrison Cemetery can view photographs of each of the 58 restored tombstones at findagrave.com, a free-ofcharge online database offering, as of March 31, 2015, "121 million grave records" from around the world. The web site is easy to navigate-go to findagrave.com, and click on "find a cemetery," to bring up a screen where you enter the name of the cemetery (Morrison Cemetery), and select country (USA), state (New York), and county (Rensselaer), click on "search," and you will arrive at the Morrison Cemetery in Cropseyville. To view the tombstones, click on "view interments," and the next screen will present a list of burials by name; click on a name to see the tombstone. In most cases you will be able to view images of the tombstone before as well as after restoration. The Society's decision to fund restoration of this historic burial ground was a wise one, and one of which we may all be proud.

The findagrave.com web site has been around since 1995, was founded by Jim Tipton who had a yen for visiting the graves of the famous, and, somewhere along the way, the idea of posting the graves of all blossomed to make the site one of the most popular family history research venues on the web. Findagrave.com's success and popularity caught the attention of ancestry.com which didn't lose any time in acquiring the site as a subsidiary. Unlike ancestry.com, which charges for its services, findagrave.com requires no fees (but will accept donations). One may search the site anonymously but must register to post a photograph, burial information or comments, or to leave a virtual flower, etc. The success of the web site is attributable to its unpaid contributors volunteers who visit cemeteries, photograph tombstones or otherwise obtain burial information for cemeteries that may no longer exist or in cases where no tombstone can be found.

After exploring the Morrison Cemetery online, search for other local cemeteries or go back to the search page and enter the name of an ancestor or acquaintance whose place of burial you may not know. You may have immediate success, and, if not, periodically check back with findagrave.com as new

information is continuously posted. If you find the grave you seek, you might wish to register and upload a photograph or biographical information or link ancestors 'graves--be sure to read all instructions and terms of service! If you find yourself becoming a fan of findagrave.com, you might want to watch the free-of-charge online video tutorials offered by ancestry.com; go to http://youtube.com and search for "Barefoot Genealogist-findagrave tutorials."

Almost all cemeteries in Brunswick, including many obscure family burial grounds on private properties, have been posted to findagrave.com by volunteer contributors at this time. About a year ago two experienced volunteers, Alysia Hamilton of Troy and Ed Dodge of Sand Lake, noticed several Brunswick cemeteries had been only partially photographed or not at all, and resolved to photograph any and all tombstones they might find. Mr. Dodge studied the cemetery maps and burial listings at the Society, and occasionally turned to Society docents, Town Clerk Bill Lewis, Assessor Steve Rooney, and me for assistance. Undaunted by encounters with poison ivy, ticks, and snakes, Ms. Hamilton and Mr. Dodge, armed with pruning shears and cameras, began snapping photographs of the tombstones of those who came before us. Permission to tread private properties was often sought and most town residents found cooperative. A third findagrave.com contributor, Chris Philippo—a skillful, thorough researcher—recently joined his comrades in exploring Brunswick cemetery history, and has discovered some interesting material such as the fact that the Eagle Mills Cemetery was mentioned in several turn-of -the-twentieth-century obituaries by the name Sunnyside Cemetery in Eagle Mills.

All volunteer contributors to findagrave.com deserve recognition. I don't know the names of the dozens I note earlier posted Brunswick cemetery and tombstone photos to findagrave.com, but understand some may have desired simply to memorialize the tombstones of ancestors while others may have had just enough time to capture a few images. The energy and enthusiasm Alysia Hamilton and Ed Dodge have demonstrated for this project is extraordinary! Ms. Hamilton has submitted over 110,000 photographs of cemeteries and tombstones in Brunswick, Troy, and beyond to findagrave.com in recent years, and has organized groups of volunteers for clean-ups and gravestone repairs, relying greatly on guidance

from Joe Ferrannini, at several Troy cemeteries including New Mt. Ida Cemetery. It was Ms. Hamilton who photographed and posted images of the restored tombstones at the Morrison Cemetery, and, as soon as the snow began to melt this spring, encouraged Ed Dodge to continue their search for the several old Brunswick burial grounds that could not be found last year. Ms. Hamilton says her interest in preserving cemeteries and their history stems from her early acquaintance with a small burial ground on her grandfather's farm and the life stories of those buried there. Ed Dodge, who has submitted over 10,000 photos to findagrave.com, plans to continue committing a few more of his golden years to this work "as long as there are cemeteries to photograph," and attributes his dedication to the findagrave project to locating the grave of a nephew killed in Vietnam through the web site. He recalls, "About 2011 a man in Florida posted the photograph of the grave I'd looked for since 1966, and that made me realize I could help people with a similar quest."

Much of the information Ms. Hamilton and Mr. Dodge used to locate cemeteries and verify faded tombstone inscriptions or posted to findagrave.com when no tombstone could be found was compiled over many years by various local DAR chapters, professional genealogists such as the late Francis Broderick and Doris Sheridan, and Don and Claire Radz, Church of Latter Day Saints missionaries who quickly became known as Rensselaer County's "Cemetery Sleuths." Their extensive compilation of Rensselaer County burials has long been available at <a href="http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~nyrensse/bruncem.htm">http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~nyrensse/bruncem.htm</a> and is now being cross referenced with like postings as they appear on findagrave.com. Check it out, take a walk through a cemetery, and—if we see you with a camera—we'll know you've become addicted, too!


#### ANNUAL REPORT FOR GENEALOGY

(My) Secret Brunswick June – November 2014

In 2014, the Exhibit Committee developed and installed an art exhibit, (My) Secret Brunswick, which showcased the work of local artists. Beginning in March, the committee invited local (county-wide) artists to submit up to three works that interpreted the theme of a "secret" or personal Brunswick. The goal was to have the artist draw inspiration from the physical or mental landscapes, people, life, nature, etc. of the Town of Brunswick and relay that through two or three dimensional work. Sales of the art were at the artist's discretion and the committee asked each artist if they would be willing to donate a percentage of the purchase price to the Society, to support our educational and historical mission.

A total of 17 artists participated, and their work ran the gamut – from carved wood bowls made from trees in Brunswick, to paintings done decades ago by local family artists, portraying buildings no longer extant in the community.

An opening reception was held June 5, 2014. Program Chair Phyllis Harrison arranged for June Leary, Curator of Education at the Hyde Collection, to join us. To supplement our exhibit theme, Ms. Leary presented *Upstate Treasures: Landscapes and Collections*, which focused on landscape painting in upstate New York.

A total of 53 people attended the opening and subsequently 3 pieces were sold by the end of the exhibit.
