information on most of the people who are buried at the cemetery. It's always nice to put a face to the name. While some information I look for doesn't seem to exist at all, for others I find a great deal.

Please enjoy this month's selection of facts and history from Forest Park Cemetery.

CHARLES KREBS

KINGS PLOT

Charles Krebs was born in Massachusetts in 1871. His wife Elizabeth Shepard (1886-1969) is buried with him. He was a salesman for the Hudson Valley Fuel Corp. He resided in Green Island.

The funeral of Charles W. Krebs was conducted at 2 p.m. today from the J. W. Burns Sons. Inc., Fifth Avenue Funeral Chapel, Rev. Frederick C. Bennett, pastor of the Green Island Methodist Church, officiated, Interment was in Forest Park Cemetery.

JOHN GROSS_ KINGSLOT

Stone was fixed 2018

John Gross was born in Germany in 1847. He immigrated to the US in 1887. Mr. Gross was a Forman at the Burden Iron Works in Troy. His first wife was Elizabeth (1937-1899) is buried with him, along with his son Peter Gross (1873-1935).





The funeral of George Gross was held this marning from the undertaking rooms of charles P. Bragle. Rev. Edward Lang officiated. Interment was in Forest Park Cemetery.

JOHN DANKS

KINGS PLOT

No Stone

John Danks Sr. (1841-1931) was born in England. He and his wife Mary (1843-1906) resided in the City of Troy. John Sr. was an iron worker in Troy. They had four children who are buried with them: Francis (1863-1922); Lena (1873-1933) and John Jr. (1865-1933) who died on the same day; and Benjamin (1890-1904) who died at work at the nail factory. John Jr.'s wife Susan (1867-1903) and their son Charles (1890-1934) are also buried in the family plot.

The newspaper reported that John Jr. had a heart attack early in the morning at the Burden Iron Works, where he worked. When his sister was notified of what had happened to her brother an

DOUBLE FUNERAL.

A double funeral for John Danks, who died suddenly Monday morning at the Burden Iron Co., and for his sister, Mrs. Fred Ham, who succumbed to a heart attack at the news of his death, was held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the residence, 266 Stow Avenue, where services were conducted by Rev. Gay D. MacChesney, pastor of Levings Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. John M. Harris of St. James' Church, Cohoes, a former pastor at Levings Church. Interment was in Forest Park Cemetery.

John Danks, one of the oldest and best known residents of the southern section of Troy, died last eve ning at the Samaritan Hospital after a long illness. Mr. Danks was born in England 90 years ago, but had been a resident of Troy since he was a boy. He was a member of Levings Methodist Church. A son, John H. Danks, and two daughters, Mrs. Edward P. Green and Mrs. Fred Ham, all of Troy, survive. The funeral will be held privately from the residence, 266 Stow Avenue, Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Services will be con ducted by Rev. John M. Harris, pastor of Levings Church, and interment will be in the family plat in Forest Hill Cemetery.

hour later, she succumbed to a heart attack on the spot. It was reported that they were close all their lives and lived in the same house. He was 69 and she was only 39 years old.

VIER___KINGS LOT

George Vier (1831-1902) was born in Germany. He and his wife Sarah (1845-1931) lived in the City of Troy. George was a shoe maker and a musician. He played the viola and became a member of Doring's Band in 1857. The band was very popular in Troy in the 1900's. When George passed, the paper said that "he was one of the oldest members" of the band.

Along with their children Charles (1866-1929), Isabell (1877-1943), Clara (1873-1955), Isabell and Clair lived together in Troy, as cited in the 1940 census.



-The death of George Vier, one of the oldest members of Doring's Band, occurred yesterday afternoon at the family residence, 708 Jacob Street. Mr. Vier was a native of Germany, where he was born seventy-one years ago. He resided in Troy fifty years, and became a member of Doring's Band in 1857. Mr. Vier was a shoemaker and was employed for years by Charles H. Wilson. He is Charles H. Wilson, by his wife, thr survived. three sons and two funeral will be held from the residence Friday morning at 9 o'clock. The will be conducted by Rev. W. Babcock of Holy Cross Church, of which the deceased was an attendant. Rev. James A. Smith, curate at St. Paul's Church, will assist in the serv-ices. The members of Doring's Band met last evening and it was decided to attend the funeral in a body and render selections at the grave. The committee in charge includes George F. Doring, J. P. Hooley, W. G. Franke and George
